The last eight weeks have been challenging and heart breaking. My sister-in-law, 65 years old, died early in September, in a fall while hiking in the Pyrenees Mountains in Spain. She was an experienced mountaineer, having hiked all over the world from New York to the Himalayas, from Laos to New Zealand, and from Azerbaijan to Peru. Yet even though she had experience, she fell in a ravine and died. Almost a month later, my best friend's son, 40 years old, died in a fall down a ravine while out working cows. During these eight weeks, I attended a meeting for an organization I joined in 1985. When I joined, it was a Christian organization, and now it is no longer. The organization wishes to make changes to exclude Christian thought and wishes to hide what the organization is doing at our college and to our members. It was disheartening and added to the heavy heart I was already feeling. I returned from my sister-in-law's funeral to find that my pastor was called to a new position and will be leaving soon.

During all these trials, I began to wonder what God was telling me.t I had was the realization that our time on earth is short, and we don't know when our life on earth will end, regardless of whether we are healthy or not. Next. I wondered how I should be spending the time I've been given? Lastly, I realized I am surrounded by those who love me, and I don't want my sorrow to overwhelm me. I must remind myself that I have a Lord and Savior to call on with all my trials, all my temptations, all my sorrows. This Savior reminds me to "Stand up, stand firm, and be Counted"; He reminds me that I belong to Him; I am to hear His call and trust in Him with my life.

As this depression and heaviness pulled at me, I comforted my friend and her family, helped my brother and his family, and shared thoughts with members of my organization. More powerfully, I feel the pull of Jesus, to turn to Him to be renewed as a new church year begins. Jesus calls me to be more diligent in prayer and Bible study, so that I can learn the will of God for me. The hope of Advent draws me to find time to look for Jesus and his coming into this world for me and for you. It is a time of anticipation, a time of something new coming. May your struggles, trials, and sorrows be comforted by the Word of God as you look to the new year and the celebration of Jesus coming to us as a small baby for our salvation. Blessings,

AMR Women's Conference

On October 13, about 25 women of the Atlantic Mission Region met at Saint Paul, in York, PA. Our theme was "Showers of Blessings."

The Rev. Dr. Amy Little led us through a Bible study on "Disciples Who Learned and Served with Jesus." She talked about how the females around Jesus' life served him in many ways and were some of the first disciples.

Pr. Amy also shared with us the global ministry of "Days for Girls," which provides reusable feminine products to female students in third world countries, so then they can continue to attend school during their cycle.

Mary also shared how Walmart gift cards are desperately needed for Maui. They don't have Lowes or Home Depot, and are restricted from rebuilding for political reasons.

Amy Werner shared about the WNALC, with a quick tour of the website. She also shared about the upcoming AMR Women's retreat in the spring, which will be at Black Rock Retreat Center, Quarryville, PA.

Our ladies also enjoyed a time of sharing ideas, activities, and outreach done in their prospective congregations.

Great Rivers Northern Illinois Fall Gathering

On September 16, four of the northern Great Rivers mission district congregations were invited to a Fall Women's Gathering. Two of the churches were well represented; the other two had commitments for the day. Because our churches are not located close to each other, the gathering was held at New Life Lutheran Church (LCMC in Sterling, IL). Immanuel Lutheran, Altona and St Paul Lutheran, Oregon were well represented with approximately 16 members present. The event had a kitchen theme and each attendees brought items to donate for kitchen kits for Disaster Response. Fifteenth kitchen kits were donated! The morning was highlighted by a speaker from NIU who spoke on My Plate and healthy eating. A short business meeting was held - the women voted unanimously that they would like to meet again - suggesting twice a year. The morning concluded with a catered lunch. Expenses were covered by a Thrivent Action Team Event grant.

This event came about through the mission district meeting segment of the Women's Gathering in Oklahoma City in August. As it happened, Sharon and Sandy were the only two representatives present at the gathering and their churches are about three hours apart in the northern portion of Illinois. When we met we were challenged with coming up with ideas for our mission district. By the time we left the National Gathering, the event and location were planned! Thank you to the officers for challenging us!



The NALC Disaster Response Volunteer Training Program is available on line. The slide presentations and their worksheets are ready for your use. A description of how to access the training can be found on the NALC website thenalc.org.

The invitation to participate in training is extended to one and all. There are four basic divisions. Choose to start with Division One-Regular Volunteer, if you are contemplating becoming a volunteer (or you are contemplating returning to do another disaster response). Or, start with Division Two-Trained Volunteer, if you desire to get a better understanding of what a disaster victim is going through so that you may better relate with them.

After that, you may decide to go on to become a trained Prayer Minister (Division Three). And perhaps after that, go on to become a Spiritual Care Provider (Division Four).

It will be a while before an effort is put into the Electives for Division Five. After the beginning of the year we will look into providing audio and visual recording options for all the present training presentations.
