Our Saviour's Lutheran Church Update for March 23, 2020

Dear Friends in Christ,

We are going to try something different for our communication for the next few weeks. Usually we send out a monthly newsletter. I'm going to stop that for the time being. At this point I really don't know what our schedule will look like in April. Things are changing just to rapidly. In an effort to be more timely, we are going to send out weekly messages. For those of you who receive flocknotes, our electronic weekly update, this will be very much the same as what we've been doing. For those of you who receive the paper newsletter, you will get a shorter mailing each week.

Let me begin by sharing a devotional. This is actually part of an article written by Pastor David Dykes of Green Acres Baptist Church here in Tyler. You have to love it when a Lutheran like me is quoting a Baptist preacher because the Baptist is doing some great teaching about Martin Luther! Pastor Dykes wrote:

LAST SUNDAY, I spoke about how Martin Luther stayed and ministered to sick people during the plague in Wittenberg in 1527. My friend, Jim Denison, wrote in his Daily Article yesterday about Luther's commitment to ministering to people during the crisis. But Luther also was careful to practice personal hygiene and a form of social distancing.

LUTHER WROTE: "I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance infect and pollute others, and so cause their death as a result of my negligence." Throughout the plague Luther continued to preach and help those who were hurting. No doubt, this experience increased his confidence in the power of God and his desire to live for God.

TWO YEARS after the plague he wrote his famous hymn "A Mighty Fortress is our God." These powerful words encourage me and I hope they encourage you.

Luther began:

"A mighty fortress is our God, A bulwark never failing; Our helper He, amid the flood Of mortal ills prevailing."

Then he asked:

"Did we in our own strength confide?
Our striving would be losing.
Were not the right Man on our side,
The Man of God's own choosing.

You ask who that may be?
Christ Jesus, it is he;
Lord Sabaoth (Angel Armies) his name,
From age to age the same;
And he must win the battle."

And Luther concluded:

"Let goods and kindred go, This mortal life also; The body they may kill: God's truth abideth still, His kingdom is forever!"

Thank you Pastor Dykes!
