

OSLC Library Book Review


C.S. Lewis (1898-1963) A Grief Observed (1961)

Audience: Recommended for 18 years and older, people supporting others who are grieving, and spousal loss survivors.

C.S. Lewis was an academic, writer and Christian apologist, best known now for his children's book series The Chronicles of Narnia. This slim (76 page), volume gives readers insight into a more complex, private, and tormented Lewis than any of his other work. It is best seen as an almost accidental memoir made up of entries from Lewis' private journals following the loss of his wife, poet Joy Davidman, who died of cancer on July 13, 1960. Comprising four chapters, the book recounts Lewis' progression through the stages of grief as he struggles to come to terms with his wife's death. Each chapter explores a new phase of mourning as he openly and honestly sets out his deeply personal feelings that involve shock, anger, despair and ultimately acceptance.


I think the question that drives youth ministry is not "How can we capture/keep the young for the church?" but rather "How can we encounter the living God with and alongside our young people?

In fast-paced and frantic times, Christian teens are becoming increasingly overwhelmed by the problems, challenges, and temptations of life. Many teens feel completely lost in life because they also feel unloved, guilty, worthless, weak, alone, anxious, and afraid. Before they know it, teens quickly become so overwhelmed that these feelings can become their new reality and identity. Teens become so lost that they can't answer one crucial question, "Who am I?"

Therefore, one of our studies this Fall will help teens understand clearly the answer to that question. We will work through three brief videos in class and discuss the Bible texts presented. These texts will help our teens to understand that their identity can be found in Jesus Christ and the facts of who He is, what He has done, and what He has said. Those facts will provide a sure foundation for life and in turn will bring true feelings of happiness, joy, and peace.

An additional resource on this topic is "Who Am I? Understanding Your Identity in Christ Through Facts Not Feelings" by Dr. Phil Huebner. This book will be available to our teens and a copy will be placed in our church library. Teens who read this book will find help in living with certainty and confidence because they know the answer to the question, "Who am I?"



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
